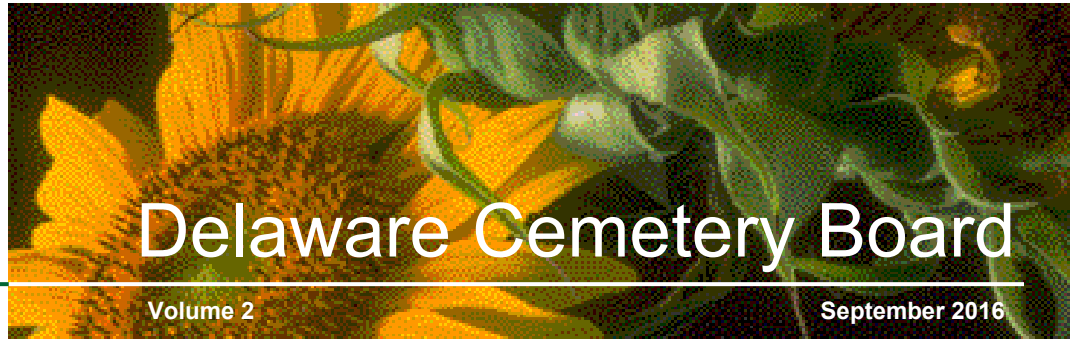

Delaware Cemeteries Required to Register

All Delaware cemeteries are required to register with the Division of Public Health every five years or upon change in ownership in accordance with Delaware Code: 29 Del. C., c. 7906A. The registration fee is \$10.00 and checks are payable to the State of Delaware. The form and payment are sent to Candace Casto at the address listed to the left. Legislation also established the Distressed Cemetery Fund, which provides financial assistance to cemeteries lacking sufficient financial resources. Funds are used to maintain and preserve any land or structure used or intended to be used for the interment or entombment of human remains. Cemeteries

must be registered before they are eligible to apply for funds. The maximum amount that may be requested is \$10,000 which must be matched with real dollars and/or volunteer hours. All application packages are submitted to the Delaware Cemetery Board for approval two weeks before a scheduled board meeting.

The Division of Public Health refers complaints to the appropriate agency and investigates violations of laws and regulations. Vandalism in a cemetery should be immediately reported to the local police jurisdiction in which the cemetery is located.

Distressed Cemetery Fund Highlights

In Fiscal Year 2016, seven cemeteries received awards totaling \$62,437.50. Awards were used to repair and restore tombstones, fences, stone walls, and gates; and to remove trees and brush. The seven awardees were:

- ◆ Wilmington & Brandywine Cemetery
