## **SIM Grant and Program Administration**

- Q4 Quarterly Progress Report was approved by CMMI in March; posted on HCC's SIM website: <u>http://dhss.delaware.gov/dhcc/sim.html</u>
- Year 2 Annual Report is due to CMMI on May 2<sup>nd</sup>
  - Will include summary of accomplishments, challenges encountered, and report of expenditures

#### Shift in approach to Year 3 work

- Completing contract with McKinsey & Co. as of April 13
- Will be structuring funding opportunities through state procurement to accomplish Year 3 goals approved in Operational Plan

### SIM Grant Administration—Year 2 Carryover

- The Health Care Commission submitted its Year 2 carryover funds request to the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation on April 3<sup>rd</sup>.
  - Developed with input from DCHI and stakeholders
  - Requested \$4,959,989.96
- Carryover request provides justifications for unspent funds, such as:
  - Lower-than-anticipated enrollment in practice transformation
  - Changes in strategy that resulted in cost savings
  - Incomplete, approved Year 2 activities
- And proposes redistribution of funds to continue progress on incomplete activities and support additional initiatives such as payment reform, HIT infrastructure, and workforce development



## **Program Area and DCHI Updates**

- The DCHI Board welcomed DHSS Secretary Dr. Kara Walker as a new Board member in March. The Board also approved and welcomed two new members during its March 8<sup>th</sup> meeting:
  - Nick Moriello President, Health Insurance Associates
  - Cindy Bo Chief Strategy and Business Development Officer, Nemours Children's Health System
- Progress is being made on a number of initiatives as DCHI pursues its 2017 goals and performance metrics:
  - The Community Health Worker (CHW) Sub-Committee developed a draft definition, scope of practice, and core competencies for Delaware CHWs.
  - The DCHI Clinical Committee intends to target communications to primary care practices and focus on provider engagement
  - The DCHI Workforce and Education Committee is reviewing lessons learned from other states regarding the implementation of a statewide credentialing verification organization.

### Healthy Neighborhoods Update – Wilmington/Claymont

- Nearly 80 stakeholders gathered in March to support the Wilmington/Claymont Healthy Neighborhood.
- The Council signed Healthy Neighborhood commitment letters and came to a consensus on core values needed to guide program implementation moving forward.
- Three task forces met to work on priority health issues:
  - Behavioral Health completed a strategic thinking framework
  - Healthy Living and Chronic Disease Prevention/Management emerged after meeting with the City of Wilmington Department of Parks and Recreation
  - Maternal and Child Health engaged in a consensus process to synthesize best practices and lessons learned from providers regarding top priorities for helping infants and families thrive.
