The Facts.

Medicare Fraud and Abuse is Prevalent

Studies have shown that fraud happens in 1 out of every 10 Medicare charges. What is Medicare fraud and abuse?

Here are the facts.

Medicare fraud and abuse happen when:

- Medicare is asked to pay for services that were not provided
- Medicare is asked to pay too much for service
- Medicare is asked to pay for services that were not needed.

The only way to identify fraud and abuse is for beneficiaries to carefully review their Medicare Summary Notice. The Senior Medicare Patrol teaches

Medicare fraud and abuse can be done by:

- Doctors
- · Hospitals and Nursing Homes
- · Home Health care Companies
- Medical Equipment Suppliers
- Laboratories
- Drug Stores

Most health care providers are honest. Sometimes mistakes are made. But there are also those who purposely prey on the elderly. The Senior Medical Patrol works to identify and stop these individuals and organizations

Empowering Others

As a Delaware Senior Medicare Patrol volunteer, you'll educate beneficiaries and their families about Medicare fraud and abuse, and show them how to protect themselves and to detect fraud, abuse and errors.

You may give presentations, meet with community groups, provide one-on-one counseling, and speak to people of all ages who are interested in doing their part to stop fraudulent practices. Specifically, you'll help empower others by helping them learn to:

Keep Good Records



You'll show seniors how to keep good records by writing down appointments, test and medical care received.

Check Medicare Statements

The Medicare statement, also called the Medicare Summary Notice (MSN), holds the clues to possible deceptive practices. You'll show seniors how to compare the charges listed to their own records-and instruct them in when to raise a red flag.

Avoid Scams



It's unfortunate, but true, that seniors can sometimes be an easy target for scam artists. You'll teach seniors to protect their personal information, and to avoid too-good-to-be-true offers of "free" tests or supplies.
