Free breastfeeding education available in provider offices

The Delaware Division of Public Health (DPH) and the Medical Society of Delaware (MSD) are providing one-hour "Lunch and Learn" breastfeeding education seminars at prenatal, family, and pediatric practices.

Over a complimentary lunch, office teams — including primary care physicians, nurses, practice managers, and billing personnel — receive helpful information, tools, and office materials about breastfeeding in the U.S. and Delaware; common misconceptions; and hospital policies. The teams also learn how to support mothers successfully, and to recognize and help with breastfeeding problems. Counseling and referral resources are shared. Offices receive a flash drive with useful tools and print materials.

To schedule a training, call the MSD at 302-224-5193. This initiative is funded by a grant provided by the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Delaware reports cancer progress

DPH presented cancer data from its new report, Cancer Incidence and Mortality in Delaware, 2007-2011, to the Delaware Cancer Consortium in July. From 1997-2001 to 2007-2011, Delaware's all-site cancer mortality rate decreased 15.8 percent, which is 21 percent greater than the national decline of 13.1 percent.
