
NEW SPRING REHABILITATION HOSPITAL



Review Consideration 1: The Health Resources Management Plan Access | Quality of Care | Cost

ACCESS | REVIEW CONSIDERATION 1

- New Spring Rehabilitation Hospital is a carefully designed response to the evolving healthcare needs of New Castle County
 - Closes a critical gap in care where the disparity of IRF beds above the Canal
 - Strengthens the continuum of care by rightsizing IRF capacity, preserving SNF access, and relieving acute care bottlenecks
 - Empowers patients with choice
 - Easy access via I-95 & Route 273 based on proposed location

QUALITY OF CARE | REVIEW CONSIDERATION 1



Intensive Rehab = Better Results

IRFs provide 3+ hours of therapy/day which far exceeds SNF levels

Leads to faster recovery, restored function, and more discharges to home


NEED | REVIEW CONSIDERATION 2

New Castle County is the largest county in Delaware but faces the greatest disparity in access to IRF beds

More than **88%** of the New Castle County population resides North of the C&D Canal (including 89% of residents aged 65+) but only **37.5%** of operating IRF beds are North^{1, 2}

Without access to additional IRF beds, patients in need of intensive rehab could:

- •Be forced to seek care out of state
- •Experience delays in recovery, further loss of function, or delayed discharge from acute hospital
- •Be admitted to SNFs not equipped for IRF-level care



Review Consideration 3: Alternatives To The Project

ALTERNATIVES TO PROJECT | REVIEW CONSIDERATION 3

- No existing provider can meet the need North of the C&D Canal
- IRF Access in Northern New Castle County Is Severely Limited
 - Center for Rehab at Wilmington Hospital is licensed for 40 beds but operates 30 to accommodate demand for private rooms
 - Long travel distances and waitlists discourage or delay care, especially for vulnerable patients
- The Proposed Project Would Not Impede Upon Existing Providers
 - The proposed hospital addresses the access gap without straining existing providers
 - Will serve a population that currently lacks practical options, improving health equity and outcomes

- This is not a redistribution of patients or beds it unlocks access to IRF care for those previously displaced to sub-optimal settings
- Bed re-balancing ensures care is delivered where it is needed most, meeting New Castle County's needs today and tomorrow

Review Consideration 4: Relationship To Existing Health Care Delivery System

RELATIONSHIP TO EXISTING HEALTH CARE DELIVERY SYSTEM | REVIEW CONSIDERATION 4

- For the last three (3) years of publicly available data, nearly one-third of Medicare discharges from ChristianaCare and St. Francis selected Cadia facilities¹




